EXCERPTS FROM THE CINCINNATI ENQUIRER, MARCH, 1990

"It's not the old Art Club anymore", Norman Doane grumbles. The days when you could drop in at the Cincinnati Art Club any evening and share a cigar with a world-famous artist or a millionaire art collector are no more, Doane says.

Doane, 85, knows what he's talking about. He has been a member of the Cincinnati Art Club for 53 of its 100 years, and has gathered volumes of historical information about the club and Cincinnati artists.

The favorite fund-raiser in early years was the Tombola, an exhibition and sale that included the auction of a "tombola", a painting that included small scenes by each member of the club. Doane spent 23 years tracking down the only known surviving tombola. He found it in a barn. It is now owned by Xavier University.

Although the Cincinnati club is alive and well at 100, it just isn't quite the same since it allowed women to join in 1979, Doane says. By the mid-1970's, the club was in decline. Old members were dying and young artists were not interested in joining. After a long and heated debate, the members decided to welcome women into the club. The women revived the club and gave it new directions, although many older members, including Doane, never adjusted. "As a response, some of the men in the club tried to join the Women's Art Club, but they wouldn't let them in," Doane says. "So now the women have two art clubs, and the men have none to themselves."

(Editor's comment) I have never had the pleasure of meeting Mr. Norman Doane, but I know he has been a faithful member of The Doane Family Association, and has made many friends in our association. PHILADELPHIA (AP) - An accountant looking through an old safe at Baptist seminary has found a lost manuscript of two famous Mozart piano works.

"I thought, gee, this couldn't be real, these are in an archive in the Louvre or somewhere in a museum," Judy DiBona said Tuesday.

The 14-page original manuscript of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's "Fantasia in C Minor" and the "Sonata in C Minor" will be auctioned November 21, in London. Sotheby's auction house said it is worth between \$940,000 and \$1.4 million. The whereabouts of the brown-ink manuscript had been unknown since the 1915 death of its American owner, William H. Doane of Cincinnati. Doane (1832-1915), an inventor and manufacturer, wrote hundreds of hymns and collected antique musical instruments, manuscripts and autographs of composers. Found with it were lesser compositions by Franz Joseph Haydn, Johann Strauss the Elder and others. They are expected to fetch a total of about \$110,000 at the same sale.

Manfred Brauch, president of Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary in Philadelphia, said the manuscripts had been listed in insurance records since 1984. But the insurance company was not aware of the potential value, he said.

DiBona, accounting manager at the sister Eastern College in nearby St. Davids, found the Mozart manuscript in a vault within a vault in July while looking for historical records. "I hummed it and played it with my fingers - I'm a pianist," she said. "I can't express the feeling of joy to be the first one to touch these manuscripts in years"

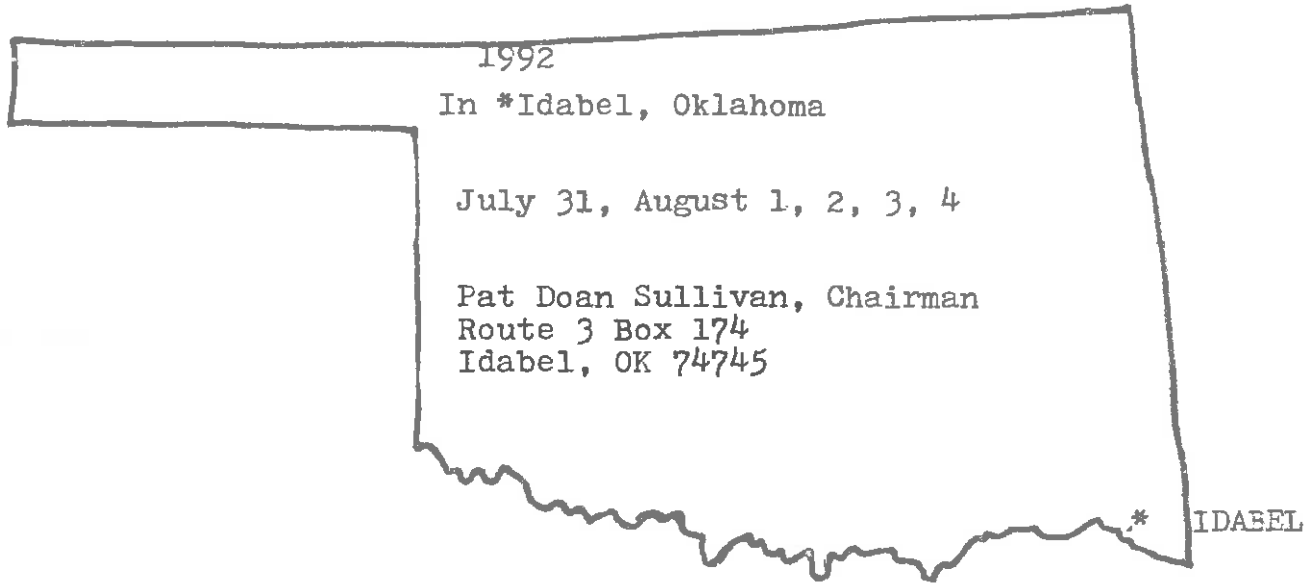
